YOU SHOULD READ... *"President Garfield"*

"President Garfield: From Radical to Unifier" by C.W. Goodyear (Simon & Schuster, 2023, 624 pgs.)

This year, our crowded bookshelves have benefitted from a new biography of an often overlooked nineteenth-century POTUS. James A. Garfield is largely forgotten today (unless you're from Cleveland) primarily due to his short tenure in office—just 199 days, 80 of which he spent agonizingly dying. But C.W. Goodyear has resurrected Garfield from the shadows of history to bring us the story of a truly remarkable man who could have become—had he lived—a great president.

The story of Garfield's life is truly an American story. From his hardscrabble beginnings through civil war to elected office in Congress and then the presidency, what comes across is Garfield's incredible intellect... one is left with the

impression that, had his presidency not been cut short by assassination, we would look upon the so-called Gilded Age differently today.

The author devotes six chapters to Garfield's Civil War service, depicting his rise from enlistment to his appointment as one of the youngest Union generals. His service ultimately concluded with his election to Congress (while still in the Army) in 1862 where he served until he reached the presidency in 1881.

Garfield served under Gen. William S. Rosecrans in the Army of the Cumberland and they became fast friends; he participated in the Tullahoma Campaign, which included the Battle of Chickamauga.
